"We stand on the shoulders of those who have gone before us" we sang at the 2005 event when we celebrated our 25 years as the WPC. ### ***In Memoriam: Sister M. Michelle Holland, SP***

**Sister M. Michelle Holland, SP**, formerly known as Sister Mary Michelle, died Saturday, April 28, at 79 years of age, after 60 years as a Sister of Providence.

Sister Michelle was a woman who saw the glass as half full and eagerly embraced the challenge of filling the glass the rest of the way. So when she saw that asphalt, bricks and mortar threatened to overrun the Sacred Heart Medical Center campus, she seized a disappearing opportunity to make a change. She championed the idea of creating a peaceful garden, the Providence Center for Faith and Healing, on the site of the former convent and nursing school. That garden was the site of one of several memorial services held in her honor.

That same desire to create positive change led her, when she was provincial of the former St. Ignatius Province, to cultivate collaboration between the dwindling numbers of Providence sisters from various congregations. In 1980, Sister Michelle became a foundress of the Women of Providence in Collaboration, drawing together 15 Providence congregations throughout the United States and Canada. She is remembered fondly with deep appreciation by all of us.



The Vigil Service was held May 2 at Mount St. Joseph Chapel, Spokane, where the funeral Mass also was celebrated May 3. Burial followed at Holy Cross Cemetery, Spokane.

## WPC Congregational News and Ministries

### Sisters of Providence, Saint Mary-of-the-Woods, Ind.

Providence Cristo Rey High School, the newest of the Sisters of Providence sponsored institutions, has 153 students who have begun the application process. The school has thus far admitted 89 students. These are encouraging numbers and the school will continue to recruit students until the target of 110 freshmen and a small class of sophomores is reached.

Located in Indianapolis, the Catholic high school is also the newest high school in the Archdiocese of Indianapolis. Sister of Providence **Jeanne Hagelskamp, SP**, is president of the school.

Providence Cristo Rey High School is a college-preparatory school that integrates rigorous classroom instruction with real-life corporate work study experiences. The school partners with businesses and corporations in the Indianapolis area for the work experiences.

The school is still in need of qualified teachers and is well into the interview process. They would love to have some passionate, dedicated Providence women serving at Providence Cristo Rey. They are seeking to fill the following teaching positions: English, math, social studies, science, religion, Spanish, physical education, fine arts, business, counseling, ENL/ESL and campus ministry.

Successful candidates must hold a bachelor's or advanced degree, current Indiana secondary teaching license or equivalent, be passionate about the mission of Cristo Rey schools and be available to meet during the summer for curriculum development. ## Congregation of Divine Providence, Melbourne, Kentucky

April 5, 2007 marked the 25<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the presence of the Sisters of Divine Providence in Ecuador. This special anniversary is being commemorated by a whole year celebration: from January 14, 2007 to January 13, 2008 in Ecuador and throughout our Congregation.

Nine sisters, representatives of the international congregation from the Provinces of France, Madagascar and the United States participated in the opening liturgy held on Sunday, January 14, at San Buenaventura, Ecuador, one of the first missions where the sisters ministered.

Little by little, the courtyard of San Buenaventura was filled with people to celebrate the Sisters and their 25 years of dedicated service to them. Two bishops and five priests were present and concelebrated.

The colorful liturgy began by recalling the life and work of **Blessed Jean Martin Moya**, the founder of the Sisters of Divine Providence. Everyone responded in song with the hymn to Providence. The entire Mass was marked by confidence in Providence.

During the offertory procession our three Ecuadorian Sisters and a friend carried symbols of the four fundamental virtues of the institute: grain represented *poverty*; fire, *charity*; a small chick in a basket, *abandonment*; and a bouquet of wildflowers, *simplicity*. Representatives of various barrios (neighborhoods) gave a beautiful poncho to each of the Sisters who had worked at San Buenaventura. Two of the sisters are from St. Anne Convent, Melbourne, KY. They are **Sister Elizabeth Wehri** who has ministered in Ecuador for 22 years and **Sister Virginia Patrick** for five years. Many speeches were given to thank the Congregation of Divine Providence and the sisters. The people of San Buenaventura wanted to prepare this celebration. They put their whole heart into it.

After the joyful and lively liturgy everyone was invited to a celebratory meal. Approximately thirteen hundred meals were served in the courtyard. Twelve pigs had been slaughtered for the occasion, and barrio bringing their own. The celebration was a real tribute to the dedicated service our Sisters have given over the many years.

This Liturgy and ceremony took place on February 19, the birthday of Emilie Tavernier Gamelin, at Our Lady of Perpetual Help Church, *Parokya ng Ina ng Laging Saklolo*, Punta Santa Ana, in Manila, Philippines. Bishop Honesto Ongtioco, DD, bishop of Cubao, presided at the Mass.

The procession into the church was led by young Filipina dancers in the form of a boat, representing the original theme of “casting our nets on other shores.” **Sr. Clarella Fink**, one of the foundresses of the Philippine Sector, read from Isaiah 25: “... You are a refuge to the poor, a refuge to those in distress... on this mountain the Lord of hosts will provide for all peoples... will wipe away the tears from all faces...” Each intercession was prayed in a different language: Tagalog, Spanish, French, English. Baskets of food for the poor were part of the Offertory procession.

After a heartfelt thank you ...maraming salamat... from **Sr. Celerina Estacio**, the new Provincial Superior of the Vice Province, **Sr. Julie Macasieb** invited the participants to a tree planting with these words: “This day marks a new beginning of our history as a Vice Province. We shall plant seedlings to represent our commitment to be instruments of Providence taking root and growing among us.” In blessing the seedlings, Julie said, “Today we seek God’s blessing on these seedlings and the fruits they will produce. Christ reminds us that, unless the seed is planted in the earth and dies, it will not yield fruit. As these seeds grow and are cared for, may they be signs of the new life that comes from God.”

## WPC Vocation/Formation/Leadership Annual Conference A Providence Journey Into Creation

The March 2007 Women of Providence in Collaboration Vocation, Formation and Leadership meeting began at Allison Park, PA with Sabbath time and moved into a time of ritual and reflection that was designed to facilitate “Giving Birth to a New Mindfulness of Creation.”

Sr. Ann Sullivan SP, director of White Violet Center located in St. Mary of the Woods, was the primary presenter of the sessions. She gave a definition of Eco-Economics that stated eco-economics brings a sense of the whole into where we exist—community, church, self, bioregion and images of God.



Ann developed the theme and everyone present began to realize that we are in the midst of a shifting worldview: “really on the cusp of past and future” and that “99% of any shift is getting ready.” We felt our map expand for understanding creation and our place within the universe. Beautiful rituals that were interwoven throughout the time together made it truly a Sabbath time for taking into ourselves a deepening awareness of the interwoven realities of the cosmos.

During the break-out sessions for vocation/formation/ leadership personnel, the richness of cultural diversity within our congregations and formation programs was in the forefront of each meeting.

A big topic, also, was the next gathering of the women in initial formation. It will be in conjunction with the Providence Plunge and Providence Event at St. Mary of the Woods **June 8-15, 2008**. The theme of that time will be “Providence People Tread Lightly on the Earth”. Plans are incomplete, but the women in formation will most likely gather as a group on Sunday June 8<sup>th</sup> before the Earth Plunge formally begins.



Our free evening was utilized for a trip to the Duquesne Incline: a funicular railway that climbs one of the hills overlooking downtown Pittsburgh. Since it was dark, we were treated to an exquisite view overlooking the point at Three Rivers, where the Monongahela, Allegheny and Youghiogheny Rivers come together to form the Ohio River. The city lights were best seen from the observation deck after the rail car climbed to the top of the hill.
