


Ky. CDPs clean water, transitions

Congregation builds wells in Madagascar

For the past three years, the sisters from our USA province have focused on a project to provide potable water to areas where our sisters serve in Madagascar. This project titled "Give a Dime" has collected enough money to finance more than five wells and support two other projects to access clean water. Support for this project has spread to our Associates and places where our sisters are in ministry. It has helped make our sisters and others more aware of the issues around clean water and has proven a way to really support our sisters as members of an international congregation.

This year the members of the Enlarged General Council will meet in Madagascar for their annual gathering. The group is comprised of the General Superior with her council, and the provincials from Europe, Madagascar and the United States. They meet once in each province and twice at the Motherhouse in France over a five-

year period.

of the buildings and property in Jan. 2013. The province will retain ownership of the cemetery, the houses at the bottom of the hill, and everything to the right of the main road. Although it is difficult to make this step, it is truly a blessing as the retreat center will continue and the buildings be used!

We have sold some property near the farm in the back and are in the process of selling the farm as well. The woods to the left of St. Anne and Moye Center will be purchased by the Kentucky Heritage Society and placed into a conservancy. The wetlands have been in conservancy for the past five years and will be purchased under the same agreement.

We are building a new structure connected to our Holy Family Retirement Home. The new building, St. Anne Province Center, will house the provincial administrative offices, a conference room, heritage room and a large assembly room. The locality of this new space will allow easy access for the retired and infirm sisters to participate in functions they have been unable to attend due to the distance between buildings. The new building should be ready for occupancy in mid-December. If all goes as planned, the amount from the sales will cover the cost of the






Log cabin replica set up, postulant enters

Log cabin replica dedicated Oct. 3.

The Sisters of Providence of Saint Mary-of-the-Woods, Ind. had a log cabin chapel replica built during 2012, which is representative of a structure that was available when Saint Mother Theodore Guerin came to Indiana, from France, and founded the Sisters of Providence of Saint Mary-of-the-Woods. This cabin was dedicated and blessed Oct. 3, on her feast day.

The log cabin chapel was built during the course of several months, initiated by the donation of logs from a cabin in southern Indiana owned by David and Faye Masterson of Owensville. Some of those logs date back to the middle 1800s, the time when Mother Theodore landed at Saint Mary-of-the-Woods. The cabin sits on the motherhouse grounds and is available for visitors to tour.

The building of the chapel was made possible by Keith Ruble, superintendent of the Vigo County Parks Department, retired Vigo County Extension Agent Max Miller and local contractor Earl Rodgers. 

SPs open up their homes and hearts

It's been more than 80 years since siblings Julia and Mary Hamilton lived together on the family farm in Elgin with their parents, brothers and sisters in the 1920's. The sisters were unaware that their life journey would reunite them under one roof again, so many years later.

Sisters Julia and Mary are also religious sisters who belong to different congregations. This summer, Sister of Providence Iulia Hamilton and the rest of her SP community welcomed into their home 27 women religious from two different orders, CND (Congregation of Notre Dame) and RHSJ (Religious Hospitallers of St. Joseph). Their permanent move to 1200 Princess Street, dubbed 'Project Hospitality' is now complete.

The Hamilton sisters now reside footsteps from each in bedrooms across the hall in the Sisters of Providence Motherhouse.

"The Sisters of Providence have been so

welcoming and kind," says Sister Mary, CND, who has made the move from her community's home on Wright Crescent in Kingston. The RHSJ Sisters left their Amherstview, Ontario house.

"We understand how difficult it is for them to leave their homes," says Sister Julia. "Especially as seniors."

Sister Margaret Morrissey is in new surroundings and settling in quite well. The affable RHSJ Sister also resides just down from the Hamilton sisters. But change is easy for the former nurse and pharmacist, having worked in Chicago, Wisconsin and Ottawa. It's a brisk September morning, Sister Margaret has just returned from an early morning hair appointment just down the hall from her

new room. She settles in to talk about her life and her new home. "It's been a small adjustment with lots of walking in this big building, but I don't mind," Sister Margaret says.

For Nursing Director Amy Litchfield, it's

been a hectic summer of preparing for the new residents and hiring 23 new staff to accommodate their needs. Amy admits it's been chaotic at times with the increase in volume and activity, but adds the new residents are settling in better than she could have hoped.

"The hardest part has been orientating the Sisters so they don't get lost in this big building. I should give them all a GPS," said Amy with a smile. Amy sends a

big thank you to Motherhouse staff and says they've been "running at full tilt."

Amy and Activities **Director Nancy Stevens** had an opportunity to meet with the Sisters in their Kingston-based homes prior to their move. "We are enjoying the new buzz around the Motherhouse and hope that everyone in the house feels included," said Nancy.

Sister of Providence Una Byrne spent her summer

overseeing the project along with other members of the Transition Team. "I believe this has been an enriching and stretching experience for us all! The cooperation of everyone, Sisters from all three communities and our ever generous and gracious staff, has made the move smooth and exciting in spite of an essential elevator being out of commission at the time. Our Sisters continue to help the new Sisters learn the ropes and find their way

formally welcomed at a special liturgy in the Chapel in early October. It was highlighted by a poignant moment when the symbolic flowers of all three congregations came together to make one bouquet. 2012 Bishop Ketteler Award for Social Justice

Today, throughout the world, there are an estimated 27 million slaves – more than during the trans-Atlantic slave trade of the 1700s and 1800s. Every country in the world is a source of and destination for these slaves. This is human trafficking and it is an "industry" that generates \$32 billion in yearly profits.

The Sisters of the Marie de la Roche Province adopted a corporate stance to work toward the eradication of human trafficking and are committed to raising awareness of the issue. Bishop Wilhelm Emmanuel von Ketteler, known as the "Worker Bishop," responded to the signs of the times and needs of his day. He was taught from early on to notice the poor, and as an adult he worked to alleviate suffering, increase better working conditions and just wages, begin education for girls in the rural areas of his diocese, and change unjust systems.

Working toward the eradication of human trafficking is one of the many ways the Sisters strive to be faithful to the call of Divine Providence in their lives and live the legacy of Bishop Ketteler.

This year's recipient of the Ketteler award for Social Justice was DOVE award-winning and Grammy-nominated Christian singer, Natalie Grant, founder of Abolition International.

With courage and compassion
Natalie began this foundation to
offer restoration and healing to
victims of human trafficking. Just
like Bishop Ketteler she works
to alleviate suffering and change
unjust systems. With others
like Natalie Grant, the Sisters of
Divine Providence also hope to
partner in this most important
work of raising awareness and
ending human trafficking.



degree and a certificate next spring in child development. She has loved serving as a volunteer in the school's day care program and for the L'Arche community, and she




Providence Associate receives international honor

Anniversary celebrations in Holyoke

The Sisters of Providence of Holyoke held three major events over the weekend of Oct. 13-14 to celebrate significant milestones in the Congregation's history: the 120th Anniversary of our years as an independent Congregation in the Springfield Diocese in 1892 and the 140th Anniversary of the first Providence Sisters' arrival in western Massachusetts in 1873.

The weekend opened Saturday morning with a prayer service and procession to the statue of Mother Mary of Providence, the Community's Foundress, located in front of Providence Place. After reflecting on Mother Mary's "life, courage and zeal for God's people," the procession moved to the "Kingston tree," a gift of the Kingston Sisters at their 150th Anniversary in 2011. The procession paused to commemorate the shared heritage binding together the Canadian Congregations represented in the procession—the Sisters of Providence of Montreal, Quebec, and the Sisters of Providence of Saint Vincent de Paul of Kingston, Ontario-with their descendants, the Sisters of Providence of Holyoke. The procession then moved to the Holyoke Congregation's newly planted "Anniversary Tree" for a tree blessing ceremony and closing comments by Sister Kathleen Popko, president.

That afternoon the Holyoke SPs, Associates, and Canadian SPs gathered with local city and state dignitaries, board members and leadership of their sponsored ministries for an Anniversary Celebration at Mercy Medical Center in Springfield. Among the program's highlights were a brief review of the Congregation's history and the announcement of three initiatives the Holyoke Sisters are funding in support of three Community's priorities: Women, Earth, and Those Who Are Poor. Also,

copies of the Sisters' new book, entitled "140 Years of Providential Caring" were distributed to the guests.

They went to a place called Gethsemone; and He said to his disciples, "Sit here while I pray." Mark 14:32

When Jesus knew that his Passion was at hand, he went off to pray, accompanied by three of his closest disciples. He didn't ask a lot of them, only that they be there while he prayed.
