

Current, Former Sisters of Providence Gather in Renton, WA, Share Memories

The 2006 and 2009 reunions of Sisters of Providence in Mother Joseph Province and of women who have left the religious community were tentative, sometimes apprehensive, cautious get-togethers. There was a sense of the unknown – what feelings and reactions would result as stories from long ago unfolded, and above all, what next.

The "what next" led to June's third gathering of about 70 Providence Women, as the group has come to be known, in Renton, WA. It was a happily positive experience for all, according to Sister Chauncey Boyle, a member of the planning committee chaired by Kathryn Kurtz and made up primarily of women who entered the religious community together in 1959.

Besides the catching up, socializing and sharing, there were presentations, including by two former Sisters of Providence, Karen Matthews, now a Catholic school principal, and by Maura (Goggin) Egan, a nurse. "They reflected on how those years (in the religious community) helped them become compassionate leaders in their roles today," Sister Chauncey said. Other speakers were Provincial Superior Judith Desmarais, on the Sisters of Providence today; Sister Barbara Schamber, on the new governance model for Providence Health & Services ministries; and by General Superior Karin Dufault on the international, intergenerational and intercultural community of Sisters of Providence, illustrated with statistics and slides.

"All of you experienced formation in the mission, charism and Providence spirituality, and in your own circumstances you have continued to be the human face of Providence as you have compassionately tended to those in need in your families, parishes, ministries and as you have assumed leadership seeking

Sisters Adopt Corporate Stance to End the Death Penalty

Sisters of Providence, Mother Joseph Province, adopted a corporate stance to end the death penalty at their Provincial Chapter in August. The action is a result of "prayer, discernment and dialogue, and will be part of our prayer and action in the future," said Provincial Superior Judith Desmarais. This is the first corporate stance by Mother Joseph Province.

The foundation for the corporate stance is rooted in the Sisters of Providence Constitutions, No. 26: "Attention to the needs of the poor and to situations of injustice which

oppress them arouses in us a concern for the demands of social justice. We therefore consider it a duty to promote human dignity by acts of solidarity with persons and groups, sharing what we have with them even to the point of risking our own security."

A committee has been actively working on this initiative since the fall of 2011. The committee members are Providence Sisters Joan Campbell, Charlene Hudon, Lenora Donovan, Lois Murray, Georgette Bayless and Charlotte Van Dyke, and Sister Eileen Walsh, OP. Sister Joan Campbell has been a longtime, tireless voice against the death penalty. She is a board member of the Washington Coalition Against the Death Penalty (WCADP), which has adopted a three-step continuum for its advocacy: raising awareness, discussing the issue with others, and leadership. Sister Joan took that third step in 1990 when she raised the issue of the death penalty in a meeting with Pope John Paul II. The pope asked how he could get more practically involved on the issue in the United States and also asked for input as he was writing the encyclical, The Gospel of Life.

Mother Joseph Province began with the idea of a statement that evolved into the stronger response of a corporate stance. The committee offered education about the issue, engaged in discussion, and joined other anti-death-penalty advocates in the state capitol for a Lobby Day to End the Death Penalty. Their message to Washington State legislators was that life without parole is a safe and just alternative to the death penalty.

to change social structures or situations that oppress," said Sister Karin, who also entered in 1959. "Whether you have been aware or not, we have prayed for you and we realize that God has continued to work within you making God's love known. We are grateful for ways in which you have demonstrated compassion and been leaders in your various spheres of influence, professionally and personally. Maybe this is a time to deepen the sense of connection among all of us and to more intentionally offer spiritual and moral support to each other. You have much to teach us about your life experiences and Providence in your life, and our experiences can enrich you as we have continued to evolve as Providence women."

Perhaps it was because the earlier reunions had helped to clear the air of painful experiences of the long-ago leave-taking and to acknowledge that hurtful things happened, Sister Chauncey explained. Evaluations from the 2009 reunion had included suggestions for a reconciliation service to clear the air of painful experiences of the long-ago leave-taking. This year, participants wrote down things that have been hurtful on pieces of paper that were collected at the offertory at Mass and then burned before the Providence Women had a peaceful parting. They plan to come together again in two or three years.

Associate Leaders Gather, Continue Formation as a WPC Group

After a Sabbath morning, the gathering of Women of Providence in Collaboration Associate Leadership Group (ALG) began time together. Thirty associates and sisters traveled from three provinces in Canada and the four corners of the United States to Immaculate Heart Retreat Center located in Spokane, WA, where the hospitality was outstanding.

The gathering was a time to renew friendships and to make new friends as this relatively new group learned the history of the Women of Providence in Collaboration (WPC) and put together a template for future gatherings. Writing the template impelled those gathered to come to a statement of vision for the group and to formulate goals. Membership of the group, frequency of meetings, structure of the meetings, budget designs and relationship to leadership were all topics for discussion and inclusion in the template. The

proposed template will go before the WPC Executive Committee for review and approval.

The primary presenter was Ann Hurst, Chief Integration Officer for Providence Health Care, who led the participants through a process designed to learn their gifts and develop them for leadership. She began by giving an overview of the day that included knowing our life stories and sense of purpose, asking the questions: Who am I and how am I to be, what am I to do and "What is my calling now". Ann reminded us that the answers to many of the questions arise from our principles, values and beliefs. By the end of the day, each person had enough foundation to begin writing out their personal call.

A bus tour featuring much of the history of Spokane rounded out the full day. Completion of the template occupied that last morning as well as setting the date for the next meeting of the ALG. After dialogue, it was decided to meet in conjunction with the next Providence Event to be held in June, 2015 at St. Mary-of-the-Woods.

The group pondered the "State of the World 2013" and "Recreating the Story of Our Time." Business was also conducted in sessions addressing financial sustainability.



Morning prayer was held each day, enhanced with beautiful music and liturgical dance. There was a memorial prayer service for all the Sisters and Associates from across the province who died in the past year.

The Commissioning Service was a

time to recommit to the charism of the Community. Each Sister and Associate received a blessing and a copy of the newly reframed charism statement.

Perhaps the most joyous celebration was the Jubilee Mass and dinner -- a time of rejoicing and celebrating the many years of service and love shared by the Sisters celebrating milestone jubilees (25, 50, 60, 65, 70, and 75 years).

When asked what her goal was for this Assembly, Sister Barbara said, "My goal was to have the

Community experience its best self. In many ways, events like Assembly, Chapter, Jubilees are when the community invites itself to be together as its best self for this moment in time . . . not the past moments, but the present. . . to dance together ... and this community can dance!"

Reframing the Charism Statement

In January 2013, the Mission/Vision Committee of the Marie de la Roche Province reframed the charism statement to speak to the present time and to the sisters today. Committee members Sisters Myra Rodgers, Ellen Rufft, Michele Bisbey, Donna Gribschaw, Sandra DeNardis, Janet Schaffran, Ella Jane Bruen, Clara Kreis, Paulita Kuzy, Barbara McMullen, Betty Sundry, Francesca O'Regan, and Associate Paula Gilchrist worked together on the spirit and the words of the proposed statement. At the end of the day, the document that they had drawn up was accepted unanimously by the committee!

To introduce the statement to the province, the group designed the opening ritual of the Annual Assembly (Sisters Michele, Janet, Marian Senish and Myra). Sister Charlene Schaaf composed a mantra for the Assembly based on an excerpt from the statement: "Living in the abundance of God's loving Providence, we dare to risk."

Following is the reframed charism statement:

Inspired by Mother Marie, who in response to the lure of Providence, sacrificed her religion, family and culture, we, as women religious called to a prophetic life form and compelled to make God's providence visible, choose a future characterized by justice and compassion.

We are energized by the life of Bishop Ketteler, who made God's providence visible as he confronted those in civil and ecclesiastical authority; who risked his status and reputation in the pursuit of justice; who opened his home to the poor, in the name of compassion.

We are blessed by God's indiscriminate graciousness, we live in the abundance of God's loving providence, and we are strengthened by the bonds of inclusive community.

Therefore,

we will cherish our intercultural and international ties; we will strive for right relationships with all; we will courageously risk being marginalized; we will live and promote every form of non-violence; we will generously share even in the midst of scarcity.




Nuns on the Bus Take to the Road Again

NETWORK, the social-justice activist organization led by Sister Simone Campbell, SSS, went on the road again in June with its second "Nuns on the Bus" tour. This time. Providence Sister Charlene Hudon, of Mother Joseph Province, was on board for part of the journey. The nuns traveled from coast to coast -6,500 miles and across 15 states over three weeks. Their message was on immigration justice, calling attention to the fact that Congress needs to enact "commonsense 21st century immigration policies that reflect our true American values".

Sister Charlene advocated on behalf of migrants, especially those who are undocumented. She joined the group in San Diego, CA, on Thursday, June 13, for the last segment, traveling through the California cities of Irvine, Los Angeles, Bakersfield, Delano, Modesto, San Francisco and ending up at Angel Island on June 18.

"From Friendship Park at the Tijuana-San Diego border to Marina Greene in San Francisco, we heard documented and undocumented immigrants telling their stories of the injustices, hardship and pain that they have experienced," Sister Charlene wrote. In addition, leaders of coalitions, business leaders and politicians told of the need for changes that must be made in immigration laws."

At each stop on the journey, the sisters passed out postcards for participants to sign. Before the U.S. Senate vote on its version of the immigration reform bill, the NETWORK lobby delivered 10,000 of the signed postcards.

"We believe that the people spoke and the Senate listened, and that the 'nuns' with the postcards had a hand in the passage of the bill," Sister Charlene wrote. The Nuns on the Bus pledged to continue to make their voices heard "to encourage true, compassionate, comprehensive immigration reform."

A New Kind of School--on Wheels!

"If children don't go to school, the school can go to the children." There is something new in Queretaro, Mexico, courtesy of the Sisters of Divine Providence. Three members of the CDP community have brought to the city a worldwide project called Escuela Movil, that is, Mobile School. The concept was the brainchild of a Belgian man who wanted to reach out to children who live on the streets. According to the project's website, "The principal object of the mobile school is to make life in the street more dignified, limiting the use of drugs and violence, promoting solidarity and dignity." Though reading, writing and calculating are taught, the important thing is to convince the young people of their talents and their value and thus increase their self-esteem.

The equipment of the mobile school is a box on wheels with panels that pull out on each side. The panels have space for very creative, interactive, educational tools where kids can learn many different things—geography, telling time, basic math, living healthy on the street, getting along with others, to mention a few. The mobile school teachers and volunteers take the school to three different locations, each two times a week, and are there to interact with the youth and any adults who come also. Teachers work one-on-one with participants or in small groups, and also plan group activities on occasion. They are loving the work and enjoying getting to know the individuals who come regularly. The police have stopped to check out just what is going on at the School, and they have been supportive.

Mobile Schools are in a number of countries in Africa, Asia, Europe and Latin America. CDP Affiliate Jessika Martinez worked with Mobile School in Colombia and brought the idea to the Sisters in Queretaro. Working with Jessika are Sisters Elizabeth Carrasco and Lupita Silva. The central office of Mobile School provides four weeks of staff training before a project begins so

that the teachers can learn the unique pedagogy of the program. The local sponsor of Queretaro's Mobile School is a food bank called Alvida. It provides stipends for the teachers and use of a pickup truck to transport the equipment each day.



Pilgrimage to the 2013 World Youth Day

On July 23, 2013, after a blessing from a gathering of Sisters, twenty five pilgrims loaded a bus at Our Lady of the Lake Convent and headed to Houston, Texas, as the beginning of their journey to the 2013 World Youth Day (WYD) in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. The pilgrims included CDP Associates and Young Adult Associates, Affiliate Bianca Esquivel, Our Lady of the Lake University students, a Magnificat Travel Escort, a Jesuit priest and the adventuresome, always-ready-to-go, super-organizer Sister Gloria Ann Fiedler, CDP.

The group started planning a year ago for this exciting experience. They raised funds through hosting events including Trivia Night, a rummage sale, a bake sale, and a Mardi Gras themed event, and by seeking donations from parishes and outside contributors. The pilgrims joined hearts and hands with Pope Francis and 3 million others who came from every corner of the globe to share in the deepening of their communion with God, among themselves and with all God's people.

In addition to the World Youth Day Events the group had some extra time to take in the beauty of Rio de Janeiro including the most popular Rio landmark, the Christ the Redeemer statue. The group returned renewed with faith and a sense of hope and commitment to build a new creation which will include a simple, loving outreach to the excluded, the downtrodden, those on the fringes of society, and those in most need of Christ and the good news of the gospel in their lives.



A Missionary Talk

As part of a missionary talk held on May 21st, the Providence International Center of the Sisters of Providence in Montreal, welcomed Sister Mary Rose St-Amant, SP, a seasoned missionary, actually in Cameroon.

Taking advantage of her stay in Montreal, we wanted to know more about the experience she has cumulated throughout her life as a SP missionary. So, in a relaxed and friendly atmosphere, we spent pleasant moments with this discreet, almost shy, but definitely remarkable woman, who celebrates, in 2013, sixty years of religious life and fifty years of missionary life!

She was very generous with her time and fully answered each one of our questions. We learned some fascinating details about the 25 years she spent missioning in Argentina and Chile: her great challenges as a nurse in the Comodoro Rivadavia hospitals, the birth of the first (model) group of Providence Associates in Argentina, the visits she paid to her native Quebec every five years, etc.

We were all charmed by the simplicity with which she explained details of life in Cameroon, such as facing a snake in her backyard or not having running water in the house. However, says Sister Marie-Rose, all these adventures are worth living as a Sister of Providence in the service of the poor.

She also explained her involvement with the child sponsorship organization and her supporting role with the Providence Associates of Koudandeng. That was a great opportunity to inquire more about "Solidarity Cameroon" (the rebuilding of the Providence hen

Also celebrating with them was a woman who later that afternoon was welcomed into the SP's prepostulancy program. "We feel very blessed that Asian women evidence an interest in becoming Sisters of Providence and demonstrate a deep commitment to serving the mission of Providence," said Sister Denise.

We will also use some of the funds to remodel the Gift Shop at Providence Center and to create office space.

Tribute to Sister Mary Caritas

Sister Mary Caritas Geary, a Sister of Providence of Holyoke since 1947, is more than a little familiar with her Community's annual Missioning Day ceremonies. She knows each is filled with prayer, song, blessings, and a shared sense of Community togetherness.

This year however, there was all that and more. This year the ceremony's usual proceedings included a surprise tribute paid to her.

"Today," said Sister Kathleen Popko, SP President, "we recognize with much gratitude Sister Mary Caritas for her past four years of service to our Community in the role of vice president. In light of her 90th birthday, however," she continued, "I want to go beyond those four years, to express our deep gratefulness for her many years of leadership in our Community. And what a life of service it is!"

Sister Kathleen focused the tribute on Sister Caritas' "extraordinary leadership" particularly during her years as SP President (1969-1977), the years following Vatican II. "At this point there were more than 400 Sisters in the Community and the transformation of religious life was at its height," recalled Sister Kathleen. "It was Sister Caritas' task," she noted, "to keep us moving forward, while dealing with the diversity of views about renewal matters, balancing the needs of those resistant to change, with those who wanted to move more quickly."

"Those were tumultuous times," she pointed out, "that called for a leader who would steer a steady course forward despite the storms of disagreement, or the waves of controversy and change breaking over the wider church. And, that is exactly what Sister Caritas did," she emphasized, "but not without personal cost."

From Community leadership, Sister Caritas spent the next 16 years as president/CEO of Mercy Medical Center in Springfield, MA. At the same time she remained deeply involved in Community matters and was elected to serve on the SP Council from 1985-1993. Following her "retirement" from Mercy Medical Center in 1993, she expanded

her already significant roles in national, state, and local civic community endeavors. Her key roles included serving as Board Chair for the Catholic Health Association, and the Massachusetts Hospital Association.

During Sister Ruth McGoldrick's tenure as SP President (1993-2001) Sister Caritas played a key role in the transformation of the Mother House into Providence Place, an independent retirement community for Sisters and the laity. And, when Sister Joan Mullen served as SP President (2001-2009), Sister Caritas worked with her on the design and development of Mary's Meadow. That innovative, "small house" concept of long-term, skilled nursing and short-term rehabilitative therapy care was the first of its type to open in Massachusetts.

Over the past four years, she worked with President Sister Kathleen Popko, and Sister Ann Horgan, Secretary Treasurer, on important initiatives to celebrate the Congregation's 120th and 140th anniversaries and to position the Congregation and its ministries for the future. These included the development of The Hillside at Providence, a ministry site for affordable housing and healthcare services for the elderly, the creation of CHE-Trinity Health, the second largest Catholic health care system in the U.S.

It was before the Community's Chapter of Elections last June that Sister Caritas, announced her decision "to retire" when her term on the SP Council, and as vice president ended. Her retirement became effective on Missioning Day, September 29. Let it be recorded here though, that Sister Caritas contributions on behalf of her Communi-

ty as well as in Catholic health care, service to the elderly, women and the poor, both locally and nationally will continue.

Even as she was preparing to leave office, she said "Yes" to serving on: The Sisters of Providence Health System's Board of Trustees; and, to St. Joseph of the Pines Health System's (SJP's) Board of Trustees in Southern Pines, NC, its Quality Assurance & Compliance Committee, and additional service on the SJP Life Board-PACE.

Sister Caritas is also on the Board of Trustees for Providence Ministries for the Needy (PMN), in Holyoke, and a member of the PMN's Planning-Community Kitchen Project. And, if that isn't enough, she told Tracings, in passing, that she is going to be "...around, working on (Community) projects."

On October 2, Sister Caritas was the recipient of the Springfield Diocese's Catholic Schools' "Distinguished Community Leader Awards." And, on October 25th the Sisters of Providence Health System will honor her with a 90th Birthday party expected to draw over 300 guests.

The honors and expressions of gratefulness will most likely continue to come, as will Sister Mary Caritas' legacy of service to her Community, and beyond.
