

Thanksgiving for These Years of Blessings!

Jesus of Nazareth, having gone one day to the synagogue of his city, stood up to read (cf. Lk 4:16–30). He was given the scroll of the prophet Isaiah, from which he read the following passage: "The spirit of the Lord God is upon me because the Lord has anointed me; He has sent me to bring good news to the afflicted, to bind up the broken hearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, release to the prisoners, to announce a year of favor from the Lord" (61:1–2).

Canonizations and beatifications have multiplied in recent years. They show the vitality of the local Churches, which today are much more numerous than in the first centuries and the first millennium. They show the omnipotent presence of the Redeemer through the fruits of faith, hope, and charity in people of so many languages and races who have followed Christ in the various forms of Christian vocation.

The jubilee is always a time of special graces, "a day blessed by the Lord": as such, it has a joyful character and our songs of thanksgiving flow forth in remembrance of the blessings that God-Providence has poured out upon us during these special anniversaries. Twenty years ago, on October 7, 2001, many of us had the great joy of attending the beatification ceremony of our foundress, Emilie Tavernier Gamelin, in Rome. It was a day of joy, filled with blessings, which have continued over the years.

We recall here, some of them among many others that have been granted to us:

2001-2021. New vocations

ing the beatification, is without doubt, the blossoming of new vocations. More than 85 young women have asked to join the Congregation and have made their profession of vows between 2001 and today. They are mainly from Haiti, the Philippines, Chile, Egypt, Cameroon, Vietnam, Western Canada, and the United States.

2002 to the present. Evolution of the Providence Associates Movement

The Providence Associates Movement, a work of the Spirit, actually began before the Congregation itself, at the time of the lay life of Emilie Tavernier. Since that time and until today, men and women have continued her work, and during the decade of the '60s and '70s, they wished to become part of the Providence family. Thus, the 1982 General Chapter adopted five resolutions concerning lay people who, having known and lived the founding charism, and motivated by the witness of the Sisters, wished to respond to the invitation of the Spirit. The first of these resolutions states: That our community accept people with the title of LAY ASSOCIATE MEMBERS. At the 2002 General Chapter, it was realized that the flame that ignited the hearts of the Providence Associates when they began their journey in the movement was still burning brightly. Judging from the echoes that come to us today, and the new groups that are being formed in Cameroon, Egypt, and Haiti, we can see another blessing from Providence.

2003-October. Study of the Constitutions

The General Leadership Team encouraged us to take ownership of our 1985 Constitutions and Rules through study and prayer and to submit our suggestions for modification or clarification of the text so that it better reflects the current spirit. Subsequently, a revision committee

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"Providence did provide, Providence does provide, Providence will provide." That is a mantra that many of us Women of Providence congregations use, trust in, and believe.

As many of you know, from the announcement in your various communities, I am resigning my position as Executive Director of the Women of Providence in Collaboration (WPC) at the end of August. I have made good friends, have lasting friendships, worked with some incredibly talented and creative people on Providence Event Core Teams, and enjoyed collaborating with the Board Members, the Vocation/Formation/Leadership group(VFL); the Associate Leadership group,(ALG) and recently, the newly formed Justice, Peace and Integrity of Creation group.(JPIC)

When I began in 2000, following Sr. Mary Catherine Hunt, CDP from Melbourne, KY, I felt scared to step into her shoes. She knew so much about the WPC's history and had done wonderful work in this ministry. She was so kind and reassuring to me and was always available for consultation in just a phone call away. Her passion and excitement for this ministry was contagious and it didn't take long for that passion to grow within me too! I truly do love this ministry and it has allowed me to use my own gifts and talents in a

variety of ways. I have given it my best. However, I do feel it is time for a fresh perspective, a new face, and someone who is better at technology than I am. Though I've learned how to manage a website, to blog, and created a WPC Facebook page, I think more could be done with other social media platforms. Technology and marketing skills can help get our publications wider known and used; I am hoping and praying there is a Sister or an Associate out there who can now "take the reins" and lead us into the future. The charism of Providence is so needed in our world today.

I don't know what my future holds in terms of ministry, but I am confident that Providence will provide something—God always has put opportunities in my path that I couldn't have foreseen or orchestrated if I'd tried! What I do know is that the Women of Providence will always be near and dear to my heart. Just look at what we've done together! These pages of the Winter Collaboration are evidence of our ongoing living out of the charism.

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was formed and benefited from the rich experience in Canon Law of the late Father Francis Morrissey, O.M.I. This was a long and serious work in which the Sisters had the opportunity to participate, which led to the drafting of a new text that was presented to the General Chapter of 2017, it was accepted and sent for approval to the Congregation for Institutes of Consecrated Life and Societies of Apostolic Life. It was submitted to the Holy Father who approved it, and the Decree was signed on July 2, 2018, by the Prefect of the said Congregation.

2003 - Causes of Beatification and Canonization

The beatification of our foundress, Emilie Tavernier-Gamelin, opens the door to her possible Canonization. However, a second cure, inexplicable by science, and obtained after the beatification had to be recognized. We were invited to pray for this great intention. And so, in 2003, a case came to our attention. It was studied at the medical level, and in the diocese of Montreal, before being sent to the Congregation for the Causes of Saints in Rome. Since then, we continue to hope that certain steps can be conclusive, despite the delays caused by the change in postulator and by the pandemic that has disrupted all activities, in all sectors and on a worldwide scale, for almost two years. However, faith tells us that Providence is watching over. As for the Servant of God, Mother Bernard Morin, whose Cause was reopened in 1995, first of all, there had to be a compilation of the writings of the Servant of God. The members of the committee charged with taking up this work went through twelve years of hard work; Mother Bernard left indeed many writings. We had to count her 4194 letters, of which 3074 were addressed to different Sisters. Mother Bernard also wrote circulars, three volumes on the history of the Congregation of the Sisters of Providence in Chile, and other texts.

Then the Diocesan Process, which ended on April 27, 2010, led to the phase of writing the Positio. This involved the digitization of the 9840 pages of the 27 volumes of the Public Copy, which are the documents that had been sent to Rome. It took months of work, with the collaboration of the postulator in Rome, to digitize and send all this documentation to the Office of the Cause in Santiago, Chile, with a copy to the General Administration.

In March 2020, Father Giuseppe Guerra, CM, was appointed as the new postulator of the Bernarda Morin Cause, and Maurizio Cancelli was chosen as the writer of the "*Positio super virtutibus*".



Thanks to the great work of collaboration with the Office of the Cause in Chile, they were able to complete the part of the "Testimonies" (Volume II of the public copy) and write the "Summarium Testium". Currently, they are working on the "Summarium Documentorum".

2005-November. International formation meeting

"Encountering Providence in a multicultural community, in history and spirituality and charism and mission." With this theme, in November 2005, thirty-nine participants: novices, Sisters in temporary vows, and representatives of formation teams held a five-day meeting at the International Centre in Montreal. This international meeting provided an opportunity for the newer members to revitalize their sense of belonging to an intercultural and international community and to share their challenges, hopes, and commitments as Sisters of Providence.

2009-2010. Congregational retreat. Community contemplation and dialogue

In August 2008, members from the General Leadership Team met with Sister Nancy Sylvester, IHM, founder of the "Institute for Contemplation and Dialogue" and explained to her that they were looking for a way to deepen our congregational understanding of the 2007 General Chapter Orientations and how best to apply them throughout the congregation. Subsequently, an international committee was established and with the expertise of Sister Nancy Sylvester as facilitator, a process of community contemplation and dialogue was adopted to achieve these goals. In 2009 and 2010, under the title of Congregational Retreat, Sister Nancy, along with members of the committee, facilitated the full week of the Congregational Retreat in the provinces of the Congregation.

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2015 – June 25 to July 8. Meeting on initial formation in Montreal

Thirty-four participants including Sisters in initial formation, members of the formation team, provincial superiors, and three members of the General Leadership Team gathered to delve into the hopes for religious life today. During this meeting, various activities and experiences enhanced community religious life. Leadership skills were deepened. Most of the Sisters in initial formation and members of the formation team had opportunities to facilitate the flow of discussions, lead prayers, or group activity. The presence of the Provincial Superiors throughout the meeting was a testimony of fraternal support and deep listening. 2021- Renown for the holiness of Blessed Emilie Tavernier-Gamelin

Since the beatification of our foundress (October 7, 2001), we have noticed that her reputation for holiness is growing day by day. The requests for intercession and the accounts of favors obtained are clear proof of this. These testimonies come from various places: Argentina, Belgium, Brazil, Canada, Cameroon, Chile, Colombia, Congo, Costa Rica, Croatia, Cuba, Dominican Republic, Egypt, El Salvador, France, Germany, Haiti, Hong Kong, Reunion Island, India, Indonesia, Madagascar, Malaysia, Mexico, Nicaragua, Pakistan, Paraguay, Peru, Philippines, Poland, Portugal, Saudi Arabia, Slovakia, Spain, Switzerland, Thailand, Taiwan, Togo, United States, etc.

In addition, between the years 2001 and 2021, the number of requests for favors that arrived at the Office of the Cause amounted to 27,922 notes deposited in the container near the Tomb, in addition to 2209 letters of requests for favors. Yes, Mother Gamelin is more and more known and prayed to... The latest means of mass communication, such as the Internet, allows people to find the desired information and the contact details to reach us; this is a blessing of the new technology!

I am aware that this list of "blessings" received over the years is incomplete. Each one of us could add the "graces" and the attentions that Providence has granted us, even sometimes, without our realizing it... Let us enjoy the end of this jubilee year to give thanks, to bless heaven, and to redouble our fervor in the service of such a good Master!

The Lord has done great things for us and holy is his name!

Every week, on Tuesdays, we prepare between 42 and 50 lunches for homeless people, vulnerable families, and immigrants who pass through our

Our experience this past year

"This year, the PA community of Tocopilla has remained faithful to the formative and organizational meetings twice a month, either through the Meeting platform or in person.

In addition, every Friday, we meet in the same way to pray the rosary to Our Lady of Sorrows, praying insistently for the end of the pandemic, for the sick, the deceased, and an increase of vocations for the SP Congregation. We broadcast the prayer of the rosary on Facebook.

We organized the Table of the King, bazaars for the purchase of food and clothing, food deliveries to those who come to ask. We also participate in catechetical formation, liturgical animation, and parish pastoral responsibilities ... everything that God Providence asks us to help with in the mission.

Community Pairs with Lions Club To Give the Gift of Seeing

One might say it was providential when Marjorie Norman, executive assistant to the President of the Sisters of Providence, had her eye exam and thought to ask the staff if there were a place to donate eyeglasses. She was pleased to learn that the Optical Shop at Mercy Medical Center in Springfield, MA, was a collection site for the Lions Club that recycles eyeglasses.

Saying that "usable glasses give new life," the Lions Club website asserts:

"Refractive errors can be easily corrected with eyeglasses, yet millions living in low and middle income countries lack access to basic eye care services. Lions have recognized the urgent need for corrective lenses and collect usable glasses in their communities to support the Lions Recycle For Sight Program."

That is all the motivation Marjorie needed.

She quickly organized a team representing some of the Sisters of Providence ministries: Hillside Residence (elder affordable housing); Mary's Meadow Nursing and Rehab; MercyLIFE (PACE program); Providence Place (independent living); the Sisters of Providence; and the staff of Sisters of Providence Ministry Corp.

During the months of November and December, the eyeglasses began arriving. When they were finally counted, the team had collected 148 pairs of eyeglasses! A big THANK YOU was sent to the Sisters, SP Associates, residents and staffs of the various facilities for contributing to this effort.

Leader of the initiative Marjorie Norman reflected, "It is special to know that these eyeglasses will give people the ability to see again. Instead of throwing these expensive glasses into the trash, we are repurposing and reusing them. In doing this, we are taking care of people and the Earth!"

Community Impact Fund Gift

It was with gratitude and excitement, shared by everyone present, that the Community Foundation for Kingston & Area (CFKA) board members Rob Wood (Chair) and Gayle Barr (Past Chair) met with several Sisters of Providence of St. Vincent de Paul at Providence Motherhouse to receive their change-making \$5 million gift to the community.

These funds will be used to help the Kingston community respond to some of the greatest needs among our youngest and oldest citizens.

The Sisters' challenge to the Foundation was to use these funds to stimulate transformative, sustainable, systems-level change in two identified areas of need: to prevent and mitigate the lifelong impacts of Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs), and to reduce the social isolation and loneliness felt by seniors – both significantly amplified by the experience of COVID-19.

Wanting to achieve immediate and maximum impact from their gift, the Sisters of Providence of St. Vincent de Paul Community Impact Fund is intended to be fully expended on high-impact community initiatives and programs over the next five to ten years. "As we look to the future, the Community Foundation for Kingston & Area seemed like a wonderful vehicle through which to leave a legacy gift to continue our Mission with youth and seniors," shared Sister Sandra Shannon, General Superior of the Sisters of Providence. "We are honored, humbled, and thrilled that the Sisters have entrusted us with this gift to drive meaningful change in our community," said the Foundation's Executive Director, Tina Bailey.

Work is well underway to address ACEs. Early results from the funding include the delivery of 'trauma informed training' to hundreds of people in the Kingston area. The training has been so well received, that they are working on delivering the training widely across the community. To make this possible, over 40 individuals from a wide range of organizations – from schools to service agencies to city staff – have now been trained as facilitators to deliver this training to staff within their organizations and the community at large.

The work to address seniors' isolation and loneliness is just getting started. CFKA looks forward to sharing with you, the impacts of this gift over the coming months and years.

Celebrating National Day of Truth and Reconciliation

On September 30, the first National Day for Truth and Reconciliation, we chose to bring into our liturgical celebration elements of the culture and ritual of our indigenous brothers and sisters as a way of honouring their traditions. It was also a way of showing our sorrow and acknowledgment of the denigration of these traditions by our ancestors and members of our church.

We wanted to find healing and reconciliation. We wanted to show our desire to stand with them in their struggles for recognition of the wrongs of the past and the pain that they have suffered. Yet we know that racism and effects of colonialism exist to this day. So, as we acknowledged the traditional homelands on which our chapel stands, we asked the Great Spirit to allow us to show our indigenous sisters and brothers that we support them in their ongoing struggle for a just and respectful relationship with all the peoples of Canada.

Orange adorned the chapel ambo and walls, and many of the Sisters wore orange as a reminder of the suffering and disrespect indigenous children suffered in Residential Schools. In front of the altar, we draped a star blanket that holds deep meaning and traditions linked to indigenous culture, birth, life and death, and symbolizes peace.

Our Liturgy began with the playing of a traditional

hand drum, followed by a smudging as our Penitential rite. Although we had all four sacred plants on the star blanket, we used only sage, a woman's plant, for our smudging. Sage is the plant used to prepare people for ceremonies and teachings. It has a special service of releasing what is troubling the mind and removing negative energy.

After the Liturgy of the Word a recording of a drumming song accompanied our reflection on what we

had heard and experienced. We prayed the Eucharistic prayer for Reconciliation and, in the final blessings, we turned to each of the four directions. As we did so, we prayed for the dawning of a new day for all indigenous people in the Americas, north and south, as they struggle for justice and equality, and for the healing of the earth itself and all relationships.

As we left the chapel, we heard again the drumming song. A fitting ending to a call to deep reflection and transformation.

Who Shall Find a Providence Woman?

Sister Myra Rodgers, XIV General Superior of the Con-

gregation of the Sisters of Divine Providence entered eternal life on December 25. She died on Christmas, not only the day we celebrate Christ's birth, but also the birthday of our Founder, Wilhelm Emmanuel von Ketteler. She will be missed by members of the Congregation and by a network of friends around the globe. Amazingly, she was an involved, energetic and supportive community member almost to the very end, when her illness, pancreatic cancer, took her energy and stamina.

In the early days of her religious life, she taught in elementary and secondary schools in the Pittsburgh area staffed by the Congre-

gation. Her earlier degrees were in music, including a Master's degree in concert organ from Duquesne University. In 1974-75 She participated in the A.R.C. program in Rome which presented the scriptural and theological foundations of Consecrated Life in Apostolic Religious Communities. From 1976-79, Sister Myra did graduate work in theology at the Institute of Christian Thought in Toronto, Canada and received an M.A. in Theology.



General Superior from 1995 through 2007.

Whether Sister Myra was involved in education or administration, her passions were the same music, liturgy and the Congregation's charism. She was most adaptable to different ministries because she met the needs of the people she served in the day and time in which they were living whether they were students or Sisters in Community.

After completing her term as General Superior, she continued to be actively involved in promoting the charism. She was on the Committee that oversaw the production of our community history book, The Lure of Providence: The History of the Congregation of the Sisters of

Divine Providence 1851-2012 by Mary Christine Markovsky, CDP. She also was a member of the Mission and Internationality Commission formed at the 2016 General Chapter.

Perhaps what fortified Sister Myra during her times of office as General Superior, when religious life was undergoing changes, was her participation in the inaugural Women of Providence Colloquium in May of 1984. The theme of the colloquium was Providence:

Following her studies, Sister Myra became involved in teaching at La Roche College (now La Roche University), and was also involved in campus ministry. This short stint at LaRoche was followed by a longer time in Province and Congregational administration. In 1990 she was elected to the Provincial Council of the former St Peter Province in Pittsburgh and in 1995 She was elected General Superior at the 1995 General Chapter held in Germany. She served as



God's Face Towards the World. The 65 women from Providence Communities assembled for the Colloquy studied papers written on providence prior to the meeting. What they discovered was in the word Providence they had "a religious concept strong enough to bear the burden of the assault that injustice, war-mongering, greed, and deceit put upon religious language." Who Shall Find a Providence Woman?

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Sister Myra Rodgers wrote a paper and participated in that colloquium. Her paper, "Who Shall Find a Providence Woman?" was one of the ten papers included in the book that came from that original gathering. In writing her paper, Sister Myra reminded her readers that for those who have eyes to see and ears to hear, there are many ways to come to know about the provident God. She reminded her readers that many who have been called, given and remembered by the name Providence are women who speak to us of the compassionate care of God. She asked what special word does the Providence woman speak to a weary and anxious world? What facet of the face of Jesus does the Providence woman reveal to those to whom she ministers?

Finally, she stated that true compassion leads providence women to justice-making in every area of their lives...to purge the empire building in our own lives and in society, to allow ourselves to know the true meaning of interdependence and mutuality. At times, she said, justice-making will necessitate change of structure and breaking control, while at other times it will be to let-be. But of one thing the Providence woman is sure-to be compassionate is to be a justice-maker. Sister Myra adapted "Who shall find a valiant woman?" from Proverbs 31:10-31 to Who shall find a Providence woman? This must have had quite an impact on the CDP Sisters in the Marie de la Roche Province because it has been cross-stitched by many Sisters and can be found hanging in many of our residences.

Who shall find a Providence woman?

She is far more precious than jewels. She offers to all her life of passionate caring seeking to do justice all the days of her life.

- She seeks out the word, listening with eager care, and the word is to her life the course for her ship.
- She girds her loins with strength and makes her arms strong.
- Her lamp does not go out at night.
- She opens her hands to the poor
- and reaches out with her life to the needy. Strength and dignity are her clothing and she laughs at the days to come knowing that God will care for her as sure as for the birds of the air. and the lilies of the field
- She opens her mouth with wisdom and the teaching of compassion is on her tongue. She looks well to the ways of her Community and does not eat the bread of idleness.
- She is gifted and given and remembered as Providence and her friends call her—hope. Many women have done excellently well but
- the Providence woman surpasses them all. Charm is deceitful and beauty is vain but the
- woman who knows intimately the Providence of God is to be praised.
- Give her a reward for her labor and let her works praise her at the city gates.

Some of the items that she has provided are a street stove to sell prepared food, a sewing machine and material, help with a water filtration system and concrete block for a family to build a room in which to live. Sr. Betsa's project gives a new meaning to teaching people how to fish rather than just giving them fish.

Sisters of Providence Join in Reindeer Games

Sisters of Providence of Saint Mary-of-the-Woods, Indiana, introduced staff to a new fundraiser this year: Penny Games. Teams engaged housekeeping, nursing, advancement, White Violet Center, Providence Center, the business office, HR, justice, wellness and archives personnel.

The contest lasted five days. Each day, beginning with pennies, specific coins have a positive or negative point value. Participants, either as team players or saboteurs, deposit coins into a team's decorated jar and daily contributions are collected. On the last day, people voted for the best decorated jar.

Penny Games is about strategy. Teams may designate members who sabotage other teams. Rogue saboteurs participate independently, dropping in a \$1 or \$5 bill to humble those top-ranked from the prior day's collection. One team was even victimized when "Mother Theodore" jarnapped their collection jar which was never recovered. The alleged perpetrator, demanding a \$10 ransom, was later captured on security footage and identified as the IT Director disguised as The Grinch wearing a Santa suit.

Designed to emphasize that every gift counts, regardless of its size, the secondary goals of promoting collaboration and engaging departments across campus were also achieved. Starla Murphy, team leader for the winning team, Providence Angels, described Penny Games as the best campus morale builder in the past several years. As winner, Murphy's team enjoyed a catered lunch from Olive Garden and was presented with a framed award documenting bragging rights as the "brightest, wisest, most fun-loving strategic thinkers of Sisters of Providence."

The People's Choice Award for best decorated jar also went to Providence Angels. Their prize was a \$25 gift card from Family Dollar to help restock or jump start decorations for the next competition.

Plans are under way for 2022. Staff is already stashing pocket change, planning the next strategy.

Staying Safe while Living in a Vehicle

Homelessness is hard to "solve" because there are so many different causes. People face so many different circumstances – some are alone, others have children. Shelters may accept only families or have other requirements.

One way to help those fortunate enough to still have transportation is to find a safe place to park overnight, free from the dangers that come from parking on a deserted street or shopping center parking lot.

Sr. Joan Gallaher, SP, (on right at bottom) volunteers weekly with the Safe Parking Program at Our Lady of Guadalupe (OLG) Parish. Sr. Maureen Newman (left at bottom) often joins her in cleaning the hut. To participate, the parish provides a space for up to seven cars, room for a portable toilet and portable hospitality hut. In the "Red Hut," participants can heat food, store perishable items and charge their phones. OLG volunteers clean the hut daily. St. Vincent de Paul Society volunteers stock it with basic food items.

The program, in partnership with Seattle's Urban League, provides safe overnight parking and permits up to three vehicles of homeless single adults or couples. The League provides and maintains a portable toilet.

During 2021, the program hosted ten families.

A 260th Anniversary Celebration—and Historic First!

Sisters of Providence, today passionately embrace our Providence spirituality, the source of our unity..." (from 2018 General Chapter Orientation)

The excitement was palpable from the moment the participants began to connect and build as more and more Zoom frames popped up on the screen. "If our excitement were electricity, there would be enough here to power all of our computers!" observed Superior General Sr. Susan Baumann in her welcoming remarks—and with that, the Congregation of Divine Providence of St. Jean de Bassel engaged in an historic first worldwide gathering of its members.

It was clear by the time this celebration of the 260th anniversary of the Congregation's foundation ended that a new and powerful tool had been unleashed in the service of strengthening unity between Sisters: no one wanted to leave!

Using virtual technology to gather Sisters scattered throughout the globe for this event was fraught with challenge and called for trust in God's providence. Storms often knock out power during the rainy season in Madagascar; time zone differences would make finding the best time to meet a stretch. Communication using four languages would have to be worked out. And no small consideration was the unfamiliarity of many Sisters with the technology and the variety of their devices and operating systems. There could be no way of telling ahead of time how things would work out. Still, as Sr. Susan pointed out after citing the six congregations of women religious descending directly from founder Jean Martin Moye, their Associate communities and the rest of founder Jean Martin Moye's family of providence, "a seed sown 260 years ago has given marvelous fruit. This is definitely something to celebrate!" And celebrate we did!

The historic meeting began with a prayer of praise, giving glory to God for the marvels God has wrought. Words taken from the founder were read in French, Malgache, English and Spanish, followed by a song of thanksgiving in each language, sung by a different community of Sisters. Everyone then raised their glasses in a toast, praying: "May we never lack confidence in God's unfailing care for us; may we do all that depends on us to keep the spirit and charism alive; and long live the spiritual families of Jean Martin Moye!"

The celebration continued in breakout rooms, where language barriers were instantly overcome by the sheer joy of being with each other. Each Sister left carrying that joy and knowing that another seed had been sown now—one that is providentially destined to bear the marvelous fruit of an even deeper unity as we continue to journey on together!



A Whirlwind of Joy and Gratitude

With training sessions and background checks recently completed, all that was lacking was the phone call, and it came quickly: a family of five from Afghanistan would be arriving at the airport in two days. It was short notice, but the Kentucky Refugee Ministries (KRM)wanted to know if they could help. It didn't take much more than a heartbeat for the CDP Support Team to respond with an enthusiastic "Yes!" and an urgent question of their own: "What can we do?"

The next 48 hours were a whirlwind of activity and excitement. Sisters Mary Duddey, Alice Gerdeman, Mary Jennings, Leslie Keener, Kay Kramer, and Margie Verhoff, along with CDP Associate Ginny Kane and Associate-to-be Robin Kelly sprang into action.

Gathering the next day at the house in Northern Kentucky where the young parents and their three children ages 3, 2, and 6 months old would live, the team readied the rooms. Donated furniture, beds, blankets, cleaning supplies, pots and pans, baby items, food, toys were put in place.

The scramble was on to find other needed essentials in various convent cupboards and at the local St. Vincent de Paul, Kroger and Dollar Stores. The empty house was swiftly becoming a home, and by early Friday afternoon things were as ready as they could be. Three team members went to the airport and awaited the family's arrival with KRM staff and a translator present via telephone. Soon, the family was also there: a sleeping baby, two vivacious young children, and a couple of very tired, bedraggled parents.

It was barely two days after the initial phone contact that another call was made to let the team know that the very grateful family was at their new home and loved it. The toys of course were an especially big hit with the children!

While the first whirlwind was over, the real commitment had just begun, as the Sisters have made a three-month commitment to support this family in any way they can. Regular visits and phone calls, assistance with transportation, caretaking and shopping are just a few of the practical ways that commitment will become concrete during the months ahead—months also awash with joy and gratitude for the opportunity to be Providence for a family beginning a new life among us, and to pray for them as they transition into a very new reality!
